Creating the Urban Interior, by Miloslav Konvička

The historic centre is usually the focus of the urban way of life. Also, in most cases, it is where the first steps of visitors lead to and where their first impressions are being made. So, the look and the tidiness of the centre is representing the whole city. Attention is now focused on the spatial management of cities, their symbolic values and historic monuments, and the overall image of the urban interior.
